

## Council jargon explained - What is the 'Precept'......

The Precept, currently £15464, is the only funding available to Ponthir Community Council and is part of the Community Charge collected by Torfaen County Borough Council from your council tax.

The cost per household varies but for this financial year it is based on £21.33 per annum for a Band D property.

In January, Community Councils submit their annual application for the level of Precept they require from their County Borough Council and we are requesting that the Precept is frozen for the next financial year.

The budget for this financial year is displayed on the noticeboards. We are committed to keeping the Precept low, minimising administrative waste and maximising the investment in grants and projects in our community.

The Community Council has plenty of ideas on how to improve the local community and support local groups as detailed in these newsletters, and is using surplus funds from previous years to fund them.

#### The Gwent Best Kept Village Competition 2014

The Gwent Best Kept Village Competition is organised by the Gwent Association of Voluntary Organisations (GAVO) and is sponsored by Chepstow Garden Centre.

We plan to enter the competition again this year and hope to build upon the success of previous years. In 2013, Ponthir scored 79 marks out of a possible 100 and the judges made many positive comments, including praise for volunteers in the village who help to maintain some of the public areas.

Some of our residents are judges for this competition and two of them, Russell and Helena Thomas, kindly gave a presentation at our January Council meeting to advise us of the judging criteria and to suggest areas for improvement.

We are up against stiff opposition from villages such as: Langstone (who were last year's winners), Bassaleg, Rhiwderin, Magor, Undy and Raglan. Judging takes place throughout June 2014 with no prior warning, so in order to get a head start, we are looking for volunteers who are willing to join our 'Best Kept Village Group'.

#### Community War Memorial and Garden

I was surprised that our community is currently included in Remembrance Sunday at the War Memorial in Cwmbran. After some discussion with the Council I feel it would be good to have a permanent War Memorial in the centre of the village. This could be used to hold a Remembrance Service for the community to remember all who lost their lives fighting for our country.

I would like the memorial to be housed in a small garden which people from the village can use throughout the year as a place for peace and reflection. The project is likely to cost in the region of £10,000. The Community Council will pay half of this cost and grant assisted funding will cover the remainder. I have started looking at memorial designs but need help on deciding the best place for the memorial, so your suggestions would be appreciated.

Play equipment is very expensive and an investment of £5000 would only provide one additional item suitable for a 4 to 10 year old.

I am hoping though that by championing the play area residents will identify their support for this initiative. This will lead to a longer term objective of investigating external funding and undertaking local fund raising in order to restore the playground to its former glory.

The estimated cost to supply and fit them for the first year is circa £5000, followed in subsequent years by c. £2000. If the community votes for this project, we will carry out a presentation of options prior to final approval.
